

## “IHM” Schools

There are four institutions that the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary sponsor and conduct as special missions that en flesh the charism of the Congregation. These schools articulate the Sisters’ mission of education from pre-school to doctoral levels.

**St. Aloysius Academy**, located on 42-acre campus on the Wootton Estate in Bryn Mawr,



Pennsylvania, is a private Catholic elementary school committed to the spiritual, moral, and academic development of each student. St. Aloysius prepares young boys to assume with confidence roles of Christian leadership and service. Through the dedication and commitment of a caring faculty and staff, each student is encouraged to recognize and develop his God-given gifts and talents so that he will be prepared to meet with Christian fortitude the challenges and demands of an ever-changing world.

**Villa Maria Academy Lower School**, located in Immaculata, Pennsylvania, is a Catholic, private day school for girls from kindergarten through eighth grade. Villa Maria, founded over 125 years ago by the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, prepares girls to become Christian women assuming leadership and service



roles within the family, community, and the church. Villa Maria Academy, known for its strong academic program and traditional religious education, has received the Presidential Award for Excellence.



**Villa Maria Academy**, founded in 1872 by the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, is a private, Catholic high school for girls, situated on a forty-five acre campus in Malvern, Pennsylvania. In May 1989, Villa Maria received recognition from the U.S. Department of Education as a National School of Excellence.

Immaculata University is a Catholic, co-educational university in Chester County, founded originally as the area's first women's college in 1920 by the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary. The university offers bachelor's, master's and doctoral degrees to men and women.
